
Thomas Hutchins was born in 1868. In 1881 he was living at the High Street with his parents Thomas (the initial F on the Commonwealth War Graves Commission certificate is a mis-reading) and Charlotte, and his younger siblings, Rosie aged 7 and Arthur aged 4. He was recorded as being a Farm Servant. By 1891, he was no longer living with his parents, and he joined the army in London.

On the 15th May 1915, the Hants & Berks Gazette reported:


"Private T Hutchins badly wounded in Flanders...."

In fact he had been killed in action and the document recording his outstanding pay of £8 3s 3d on 4th August 1916 notes "on or since 27/4/15 death presumed". Either his body was never found, or could not be identified. The War Diaries show the Battalion near Verlorenhoer on 27^{th} April. His War Gratuity of £3 was paid on 28th August 1919 to his sister, Mrs. Rose H. Trenchard.

He is remembered on Panel 35 of the Menin Gate Memorial in Ypres, Belgium.
